Glimmers #1

Presenting our continued success in fulfilling our purpose by giving remote-controlled chairs

The total chairs granted since Pink Chair Project RVA began: 76.

As expressed by **Linda Tsironis Caruthers, Pink Chair Project RVA Founder and President, Board of Directors, the Hawthorne Cancer Foundation.**

“To date, Pink Chair has granted 76 chairs to breast cancer patients. I would like to share comments of some patients that I think sum up their gratitude. My personal mission is to provide hope, courage, and faith to patients. Helping a patient adjust their thinking goes a long way to beating breast cancer. Thank you all for your contributions and support.”

Recipient Testimony 1: “In my deepest, darkest moment, why do I feel as if I have won the lottery?” [to which Linda responded, “Because that is how we must feel to beat cancer!”]

Recipient Testimony 2: “I feel like I’ve ‘kept it together’ this whole time, but this is giving me a huge lump in my throat. I often talk to friends about ‘the tribe’ and how we women must stick together and share what we’re going through with one another. I’m not used to being the one ‘cared for’. I am grateful. “

Recipient Testimony 3: “Dear Mrs. Caruthers [Linda], my name is Stephanie. I am one of the recipients of the Pink Chair Project, and I’m so very thankful for everything, for resources and for every chime that comes from life that pulls us together! Mrs. Quinn [Caryl] and Mrs. Caruthers, beautiful ladies: YOU are my inspirations for my mother figures who teach us to fight against cancer and to find resources to help one another. “

Recipient Testimony 4: [from Melissa] “I just burst into tears at this kind of loving gesture of women who had gone before me. When Linda and Boni [Simmons] showed up, it was just ‘handled’ and that’s exactly what I needed. It’s what everyone needs after a surgery of this magnitude.”

Celebrating a major fundraiser for 2024, a memorable moment-in-time (Please see this year’s pictures and sponsors).

“**Bowling for Chairs**”, Pink Chair Project RVA’s third annual Rockin’ Bowl Bash, held on November 12th, marked another success at Richmond’s River City Roll. A small group of impassioned, dedicated volunteers created a fundraiser largely attended by their friends and families. The intimacy of many supportive relationships created a warm tight-knit, fun event. According to some, the successes would be described as “God-winked”.

With the sponsors, 160+ attendees enjoyed the fundraiser. The net income for the event totaled \$9,127.95, which surpassed expectations and increased the fleet of chairs.

The event volunteers, individually and together, aptly fit the description, “movers and shakers”. Caryl Quinn was the group’s go-getter catalyst, coordinating much of the event’s success. Also, a board member of The Hawthorne, Caryl offers expertise in development and fundraising. A breast cancer survivor, Caryl is attuned to both the practical and empathic needs of chair recipients.

“We focused on community. Our goal was to get people together for Pink Chair, to feel kindness and the love of community, to support breast cancer awareness, to raise money for chairs, and to have a good time”, Caryl said. “This year had a community feel.”

When asked what brought the success, Caryl replied, “Friends and families. Whether Pink Chair volunteers or chair recipients ‘pay it forward’, there were families and friends to help and to cheer on the bowlers, if not to bowl. We are grateful for our sponsors, River City Roll, Channel 6, social media, contacts with past attendees and chair recipients, our many contributors, and the support of The Hawthorne Cancer Foundation. This year’s **Bowling for Chairs** was a love feast of kindness and support. “

Caryl said, “We offer something unique in the cancer world. We give direct comfort to post-operative patients. Pink Chair Project RVA/The Hawthorne raises money for the chairs, but we are becoming known for more than the chairs we grant. We provide comfort in a chair.”

Post-event, River City Roll’s Event Manager Heather Nicholas emailed Caryl Quinn, with praise for this nonprofit, saying, “We’d love to host the event again next year! I thought this year’s fundraiser was very smooth, and everyone seemed to enjoy themselves! The team seemed to come together well. Thank you, again, for trusting us with such a meaningful cause. Pink Chair Project RVA is doing incredible work, and it’s truly an honor to be part of it.”

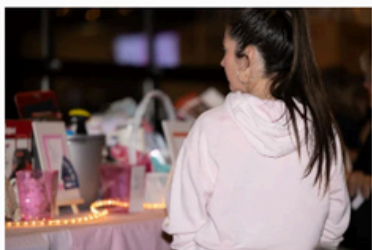

Tony and I were classmates at Pharmacy School [MCV] and 32 years later, the universe brought us back together as partners in the same store. Tony’s wife, Melanie, is a recent Pink Chair recipient.

Sitting next to Tony was his childhood friend, David Phillips, whom he introduced to our group. Since David was familiar with Melanie’s situation and what Pink Chair had done for her, we chatted about philanthropy and shared experiences. David had a sister-in-law who lost her battle for cancer in 2017. So, he was very appreciative of the work the Pink Chair is doing and asked if he and his organization could help.

David explained that he is a member of the Lakeside Chapter of the Fraternal Order of Eagles. In short, this is a national organization that “promotes peace, prosperity, and charitable giving”.

David explained to me that they like to keep their philanthropy local. He then asked me what we needed.

“Well,” I said, half-jokingly, “\$10,000 would be nice.” I quickly corrected, starting any donation or promotion of what we do would be greatly appreciated. Mr. Phillips responded, “Let me see what I can do.”

And, two weeks later, Tony and David Phillips stopped by to see me at work and handed me a check for \$25,000 for the Pink Chair Project-RVA.

Networking with Awesome Adolescents:

For the last two years, volunteers from the **University of Richmond’s Relay for Life chapter** were invited to help with our Rockin’ Bowl events. This student group, with faculty sponsor, Dr. Nancy Bagranoff, is nationally recognized for supporting cancer awareness, prevention, and research. Relay For Life is a fundraiser for the American Cancer Society. Their reflections discussing cancer that has affected men as well as women are included in the 2023 Pink Chair newsletter. Also, **Randolph-Macon College Women’s Soccer Team** has done it again. During this year’s Homecoming, they welcomed Pink Chair Project-RVA. They raised funds and spread awareness of breast cancer while honoring those affected. Zoe Long (the granddaughter of Linda T. Caruthers who shows signs of having the same “big, giving heart”) and Paige Citro spearheaded the successful event.



February 2025: The Richmond, VA, chapter of G.O.Y.A. (Greek Orthodox Youth of America) and the Greek School at Saints Constantine & Helen Cathedral, presented a generous donation to Pink Chair Founder Linda T. Caruthers. The check totaled \$900!”

With her characteristic enthusiasm, Linda exclaimed, “That’s a chair!” and then, said, “I am humbled and extremely grateful. The idea for this was generated by a 16-year-old who lost her 42-year-old mother to breast cancer a few years ago. The smile on her face is powerful...she is honoring her mom!”



Fofie Pappas, President of G.O.Y.A., spearheaded the fundraising campaign in memory of her mother Stacy Basis Pappas [mother of Fofie and Vivian], who had advanced breast cancer.

Surrounded by the youth, parents, and Youth Director Krista Loucas, Linda told the captivating story of her cancer journey and the “divinely- inspired” idea that quickly transformed into the nonprofit known today as Pink Chair Project-RVA.

Linda emphasized the need for early screen testing and regular checkups for both women and men. She further emphasized requesting 3-D mammograms. “I know of a girl who is 17 who has been diagnosed with breast cancer,” she said. “You need to know that men also can have breast cancer.”

The next day, G.O.Y. A. Athletic chair Isaac Kougoulis said at the girls’ and boys’ basketball tournament, “That was something last night. It made me think about things that I had not thought about before. It was deep. It made me care. Thank you.” What an impressive group! G.O.Y.A. donated the \$900 which was 100% of the profit they received from the New Year’s Eve fundraiser dance they had co-sponsored at church with the Greek School.

In an email, heartfelt appreciation was expressed by Steven Thornton, Executive Director of The Hawthorne Cancer Foundation, to the Youth Director.

“Dear Krista,

I hope this email finds you well. I wanted to take a moment to express my deepest gratitude to you, the members of G.O.Y.A., and the Greek School for your incredible generosity and thoughtfulness.

I learned about you this morning from our Pink Chair team. They were honored to witness the kindness and dedication of the youth in our community. The \$900 donation raised during the church’s New Year’s Eve Dance for Pink Chair is a testament to their compassion and commitment to making a difference. I am both humbled and deeply grateful for this support.

A special acknowledgment is to the remarkable 16-year-old G.O.Y.A. member whose heartfelt initiative led to this effort in honor of her late mother. I’m told the smile on her face was profoundly moving, and a beautiful tribute to her mother’s memory.

This experience is also a reminder of the incredible power of relationships.

Once again, thank you for your leadership and for fostering such a giving and compassionate spirit among the youth. Your impact is truly invaluable.”

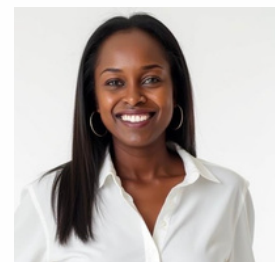

Introducing a Like-Minded “Gift” to the Community

For this edition, we have chosen to feature a “table” at the 2024 Pink Chair Rockin' Bowl Bash that created positive chatter onsite with respectfully posed questions. This table featured **“Marianne’s Wigs and Toppers”**. Seeing a variety of beautiful, strategically situated “mannequin head displays with hairstyles”, attendees were curious about the service provided by the owner. They congenially gathered at this table. Also, they were impressed with Marianne Roman’s warmth and enthusiasm. Pink Chair would like to introduce “cranial prosthetic specialist” founder and owner of “Marianne’s Wigs and Toppers”.



“I have a private studio, where I sell hair solutions for folks experiencing hair loss. Some of them are due to chemotherapy or radiation; others experienced hair loss from surgeries, auto-immune deficiencies, postpartum and menopausal conditions, trichotillomania, long-term COVID, alopecia, balding, and the list goes on,” Marianne said, “People come to me for help. They will receive private one-to-one consultations, fittings to their satisfaction, and wigs or toppers that look thicker, healthier, and more natural. I offer a fashion ‘boost’ to clients’ self-image by supplying alternate hair. “

Marianne added, “I give my professional assessment of what may be needed for the individual, plus the added ingredients of kindness and well wishes. I put a high premium on personal satisfaction. It gives me joy to express hope and instill confidence in every client. I see an amazing transformation when clients first visit me and when they find the perfect hair alternative for them.”

Marianne’s mother, Elizabeth, was a hardworking consummate professional. Under her mother’s tutelage in theatrical arts at The Harrison Opera House in downtown Norfolk, Marianne gained “an intense exposure to make-up and hair artistry that had a significant impact on me”. Even then, Marianne saw fashion and hair as having transformative potential.

This led to multi-skills ventures into higher education at Virginia Commonwealth University, with a BA degree in Fashion Design, and extensive experience in the clothing industry and fashion, including bridal fashion. When Marianne joined the Merle Norman team as a wig-consultant and wig fitter, she experienced the beginnings of her own personal transformation. This finally took root over a year ago when she established her own business, “Marianne’s Wigs & Toppers”.

She sees the power of hair as therapeutic and transformative as well as forward-fashion for many. This leap to the healing arts has reaped benefits. Marianne values her clients--women, men, and children.

She repeatedly receives five “stars” reviews.

“From the moment we meet, my clients can feel the genuine compassion I have for helping them through their hair loss experience,” she has stated, “I want them to feel my passion to help each one.”

When asked how she connected with Pink Chair, Marianne responded, excitedly, “While listening to a Mike King interview, I heard Linda Caruthers belonged to the Greek Orthodox Church. I almost jumped out of my skin! Long Greek connection short, I contacted her, and then, I met up with Kathryn Geranios who said she was fascinated with my story and my commitment to combine fashion with the helping profession.”

She added, "By attending the Pink Chair event, I could see the connections of how my information and services can be more present in the medical lane as well as how I can network with other support groups.
